Debuting at WVU Downtown Library August 2025 with companion online exhibit

About: For the West Virginia University (WVU) Libraries' Art in the Libraries 6th collaborative, multidisciplinary exhibition, we invite the WVU community to look at how artificial intelligence (AI) might impact fields of study, work, career readiness, community engagement and daily life. What will AI applications use change in engineering, science, design, business, media, agriculture, education, the humanities, the arts, community development? In today's rapidly advancing technological landscape, an exhibition examining artificial intelligence will advance and challenge public understanding and dialogue about AI's implications, potential benefits, and ethical considerations, as AI continues to permeate various aspects of our lives (See: "In Regulating AI, We May Be Doing Too Much or Too Little," *New York Times*, 11/7/23).

The exhibit will debut at WVU Libraries in the fall of 2025. Contributions from WVU faculty, classes, staff, and groups will be highlighted through designed exhibit panels and become part of the Research Repository of WVU. Past exhibitions have traveled regionally and featured in news media, expanding impact beyond WVU. This exhibit will travel to WVU Beckley and Keyser campuses, with potential for more.
